EEKS before it's happening, word is getting out

vest Festival

Images of the thousands of jacko'-lanterns - the core of Keene's Halloween-harvest celebration are appearing in national magazines and newspapers.

"It was in the Boston Globe last Sunday," bubbles organizer Nancy Sporborg. "I couldn't believe it."

One goal of the event Oct. 29 is to exceed last year's total of 4,817 jack o' lanterns. The target: 6,000. The day will also have a costume parade, judging of children's cos-turnes, music, trick-or-treating on Main Street, street performers, dressed as leaves, country line dancing, karaoke, and pumpkins - lots and lots of pumpkins carved into scary faces, ghoulish fright masks, tters, numbers, and animals. The Guinness Book of World

Records has already listed Keene as the record-holder in the Most Jacko'-Lanterns category. Based on last year's event, "they gave us a whole page," Sporborg says of the Guin-ness compendium. "You can't get better PR than that."

Copies of the \$18 book will be for sale through Paragon Cable on Eagle Court, and a copy is also available there for public viewing "All those people who were kids and carved a pumpkin — this is their moment in history," Sporborg says of the book

Area companies are interested in making the project succeed, loo. For instance, The Keene Sentinel bought a pumpkin for any employee willing to carve it into a jack-o'-lantern for the festival, and Kingsbury Corp., which is celebrating its 100th anni-versary, is contributing 100 pump-

"We've had a lot of businesses asking how they can get involved," Sporborg said.

The Keene Post Office is even creating a special postmark for the event. Center Stage Cheshire County is selling pictures of last year's pumpkin tower, with a card and en-velope, for \$2. With the "Harvest Festival" postmark, "it's a neat little OCTOBER 21, 1994



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But whatever else goes on Oct. 29 pales next to the orange glow of carved-out pumpkins. Main Street will close at 8 that morning, allowing time to set up all the scaffolding needed to hold 6,000 jack-o'-lanterns. This year, a 13-toot-square tower, 35 teet high, has been added to the two pyramids that will also hold jack-o'-lanterns, and "we've challenged Keene State College to fill that."

Booths will be set up around downtown for people to bring their carved pumpkins and a condie.

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It's also important for people to

sign in at one of the booths. The Guinness people want to ensure that the record-breaking pumpkins weren't just carved by a small crea of workers, and Lehman and Wilkinson, a local accounting firm, will tally the numbers. "Our Certified Pumpkin Accountants," Sporborg calls them.

Sporborg's own jack-o'-lantern will be part of the spectacle: "It's my way to be in the book, too. ... It's everybody in the community, bringing in a piece of themselves. That's what makes it so neat. That's why I think it has caught on."

Stage events, the Harvest Festival brings a different concern. "Every once in a while, I get this little ship What if we get thousands more

pumpkins than we thought?"

That would be a happy problem. A big event can pump money into-the local economy and make Keene a bigger dot on the entertainment
